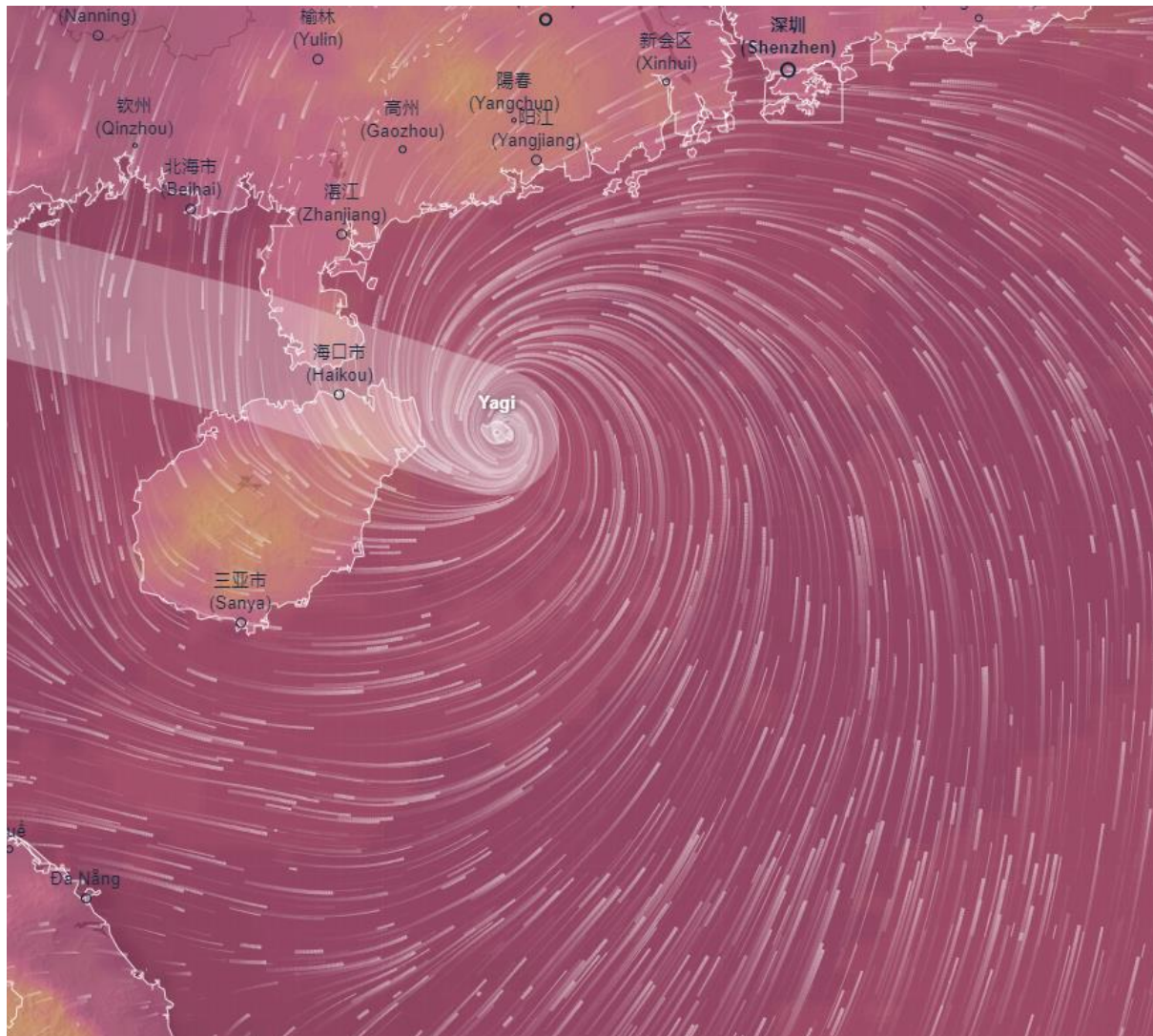


## Super Typhoon Yagi



Early on September 6, Super Typhoon Yagi was moving westward over the South China Sea. Late September 6th is predicted to see landfall over China's northern Hainan Province. Super typhoon Yagi, also called Enteng in the Philippines, is moving into far southern China early on September 6th, traveling westward across the South China Sea. Previously, the storm crossed the northern part of the Philippines to early September 3 after making landfall over the northern Aurora Province. The system's center of circulation was located around 687 kilometers (427 miles) east-southeast of Hanoi, Vietnam, as of 11:00 CST. According to forecast models, the storm is expected to land late on September 6 over northern Hainan Province. As it moves west-northwest across the Gulf of Tonkin, the system is predicted to deteriorate into a typhoon by late. Yagi is expected to make landfall on September 8 and then track westward across northern Vietnam and far northern Laos, weakening quickly into a tropical storm before dissipating over far southern Yunnan Province in China early on September 9. The trajectory and intensity forecast still has some uncertainty, and there could be some big adjustments in the next few days.
